
Alternative Media: A Platform for Change


Implementing Accessibility and Inclusion in Alternative Media Projects: Strategies and Best Practices

- Promote other awareness campaigns and events in your community that focus on the importance of other marginalized communities in education and the community. If none include accessibility needs, you can ask when they will.
- Encourage, no demand, the involvement of disabled community members, learners, students and everyone! in leadership roles and decision-making processes related to environmental studies and education. We must make and confront any access needs that remain unaddressed at this point too. Do the good work.
- Collaborate with local organizations and support groups that serve individuals with diverse needs, to raise awareness and foster partnerships
- Share resources, articles, and research related to diversity, disability and inclusion in environmental studies and education, created by disabled people of color in communities facing environmental injustices, using new social media and other platforms.
- Encourage educators, community leaders, and learners to advocate for policy changes and funding support to improve accessibility and inclusion in educational settings.
